


### From Chaos to Clarity:

"Yes, Jill?" asked Ms. Muñio.




"Where's my essay?" she asked.

"I'm sorry this experience has been difficult," said Ms. Muñio. "It's just so hard to keep in touch with families. And my time is limited, too. I feel like we're doing the best we can."



"Of course you are," said Aisha. "But here's my question: Can the school figure out a way to communicate with families so that we stay in the loop about our kids? The emails, an occasional phone call from the front desk, and the printed announcements that end up buried in our kids' backpacks just aren't helpful."

"What would work better for you?" she asked.



"Well, for one, if there's important information I need to see, I'd prefer that the school send a text, not an email. I always have my phone with me and see my notifications right away. A group of parents and I were talking about this, and we all thought that getting school notices by text would be a lot more helpful."



"I don't know just how we would manage that . . ." stuttered Ms. Muñio.



"And here's another thing that's been really hard for our family," said Aisha. "Tam's uncle often picks him from school and spends time with him until dinner. But he speaks very little English, so he can't understand any of the information we get from the school."



**"Well, we do have everything in both English and Spanish,"** said Ms. Muñio.



"But Tam's uncle is Korean," said Aisha.

Ms. Muñio was silent. The idea of the school distributing its announcements in Korean seemed like an impossible feat.



"Look," said Aisha. "The school is here to serve our children, but it's also here to serve families. We can't support our kids if you don't support us and keep us informed of what's going on. Would you look into trying to find a better way to communicate with us?"




